CONSTRUCTION UPDATE FOR 1992 Streets, Roads and Curbs -- Parking, Parks and Pools

A busy construction schedule lies ahead for 1992.

The 1991 Road Program will be completed in the next few weeks and this year's program will begin with the reconstruction of Hillsdale Avenue from Kinderkamack Road to Everdell Avenue (Beechwood Park). This work will be funded by a \$100,000 grant from the State Department of Transportation. The 1992 program also includes the widening of Hillsdale Avenue at Pascack Road to construct a left-turn lane running westbound.

The County has awarded the downtown reconstruction project to the contractor and work on the improvements should begin this summer. A scale model of the changes to be made is on display in the lobby of Borough Hall.

The Borough is continuing to construct barrierfree ramps and curbcuts at various intersections within a six block radius of public facilities. Through the Community Development Grant Program the Borough will receive up to \$54,000 for this work. Also, the new bathrooms in Beechwood were partially funded by the Community Development Program. In conjunction with the 1992 Road Program, additional parking areas along Hillsdale Avenue will be provided for Beechwood Park and a number of streets are scheduled to be resurfaced.

At Stonybrook Swim Club, the Borough is in the process of completing pool renovations that will include an automatic chlorination system and handrailings to aid in accessibility. The second phase of the landscaping contract for the Swim Club was completed on schedule in April.

Also, the Borough is in negotiations with the County to purchase some of the property owned by the county in Glenbrook Park. If successful in obtaining the property, the Borough plans to keep it as open space, or for municipal purposes, thereby

minimizing the effect of development in this floodprone area. The Borough is in the process of preparing a report indicating the environmental value of each of the lots that are available from the County.

For next year, 1993, the Borough is applying for state aid from the State Department of Transportation for three projects: Reconstruction of Lincoln Avenue between Magnolia Avenue and Kinderkamack Road; East Liberty Avenue from Kinderkamack Road to Cedar Lane: the construction of underdrains and the resurfacing of Werimus Lane.

Hillsdale History

LAW and ORDER

With much local interest in the Police Department, a glance at its past is in order.

From earliest days, in the English tradition, the Counties had Sheriffs. With the division of Counties into Townships in 1693, Constables were elected annually in each. As settlement spread, original new Barbadoes Township split off Saddle River Township, which split off Harrington, which split off Washington (1840), which split off Hillsdale Township in 1898. At this point law and order became local; we had our own Constable. Three years later the Township Committee provided him with a pair of handcuffs; after 10 years, "Special Officers" were appointed to arrest when needed. In 1913 the first uniformed Special Officer was appointed with pay: \$5/week; he also ran a butcher shop on the present site of Citizens 1st National Bank.

The local Board of Trade donated the first "headquarters", the Hillsdale police booth, in 1925, soon to be moved; a car was purchased in 1926. When the officer went out in response to a call, he asked one of the neighboring merchants to respond to the booth phone. By 1927 the force had increased to four, and in 1928 a Police Department was created with the Chief starting at \$2000 and the Roundsmen (patrolmen) at \$1200. "Headquarters" moved to the old Borough Hall at Park and Central Avenues in 1931. Chiefs in succession were Lawrence Foley, William Bulach, Henry Koelsch, Frank Stoeckel who served for 23 years, and Philip Varisco who served from 1968 until our present Chief Ronald Schramm took over.

An Update on Camp Hillsdale

This summer, Camp Hillsdale will operate out of the Ann Blanche Smith School. The program is open to all Hillsdale children entering Grades 1 through 6.

Registration begins on Monday, June 29, 9 A.M. until 12 noon, at the Ann Blanche Smith School gymnasium. Parents should bring proof of Grade (report card) and proof of residency (driver's license) when registering their children.

Registration fee is \$50 per camper. This includes a T-shirt, swimming at Stonybrook, two trips during the camping season, and the insurance required by law.

Join The Victorian Lighting Program

Walk through the path crossing Veteran's Memorial Park and admire the Victorian street lights that line the walkway. They are the result of a unique community project jointly sponsored by the residents of Hillsdale and the Borough administration and, in the near future, additional lights will line the main streets of the center of town.

At a cost of \$1500, each light is sponsored by a local resident or local citizens' group who wish to make a lasting gift to their hometown.



A permanent brass plaque will be mounted on each light bearing the name of the individual or group contributing the Victorian Light. The plaque will be inscribed "Donated by", In memory of", or any suitable inscription selected by the donor. The contribution for the lights (\$1500) is payable in three equal installments or, if preferred, it may be made in one payment.

Interested citizens, clubs or associations may see the locations available on the Victorian Lighting Plan which is on display in the lobby of Borough Hall.

LIBRARY NOTES

Summer Hours -- Children's Programs

Effective June 19th, the Hillsdale Free Public Library will be open Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 10 A.M. to 9 P.M. and Thursdays and Fridays from 10 A.M. to 5 P.M. Monday is the only evening the Children's Room will be open. The library will be closed on weekends beginning June 20th through September 6th. Weekend hours will resume on September 12th, the weekend after Labor Day.

"Story Time", for children 3-6 years of age, will begin July 8 and run through August 19. The program will meet on Wednesdays at 10:30 A.M. Several entertainment programs will be scheduled during this time.

NOTES FROM THE BOARD OF HEALTH

Safety Tips for Outdoor Pools

- 1. Municipal law requires fencing with self-closing and latching gates around all swimming pools. The gate-latching mechanisms should be out of reach of children. For above-ground pools, steps and ladders must be removed when the pool is not in use
- 2. WARNING-- Recent statistics show that the major reason for pool accidents and drownings is lack of adult supervision. It takes less than a minute for a child to drown. Adults must position themselves where they have an unobstructed view of the entire pool and the children using it. Practice safety drills with the children by teaming each child with a buddy, occasionally stopping the activity to have each child hold up the hand of his or her buddy. Rough play around swimming pools is extremely dangerous and should be discouraged. Diving into shallow areas must be prohibited.


