A Year of Making

In addition to continuing a high level of traditional library service, we greatly expanded our Maker Program in 2014. Maker programing promotes learning through hands on crafting, tinkering, and engineering using a variety of traditional tools and technology tools.

The Hillsdale Library received a \$3,750 Maker Space contract from the New Jersey State Library and LibraryLinkNJ, the State Library Cooperative. With additional funding provided by the Friends of the Hillsdale Library, a permanent makerspace was established in Laura's old office on the main floor. Awards were provided to participants of the Maker Faire, held in April. The Library hosted a series of activities as an official Google/Make Magazine Maker Campsite during the summer. The year of making was punctuated with an invitation to become a hub location and committee participant for NJ Makers Day, a state-wide initiative to bring awareness to maker culture in New Jersey. Hillsdale Library's "Think It, Make It, Share It" logo is prominently included on those promotional materials.

The Annual Report demonstrates how we help our patrons pursue their passions.



"The Pascack Pi-oneers FIRST Robotic Team 1676 has partnered with the Hillsdale Library in various ways, bringing information to the community, but especially the community children. 

3,243 Hillsdale Cardholders used their card at least once in 2014.

An additional 1,699 used their card at least once in the last two years. 359 new library cards were issued. There are 6,878 registered Hillsdale Library cardholders. Every place maker on this Google Map indicates an address of someone in Hillsdale that used their library card in 2014.



Over 1,300 visitors participated in 146 activities sponsored by community organizations.

The meeting room is utilized by the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, senior clubs, the Pascack Valley Stitchers and Quilters, Kids for Earth, the Science Fiction Society of Northern New Jersey, and numerous other community organizations.



Kids For Earth

We added Zinio as a digital service



Zinio permits users to download and view the entire magazine issue in digital form. 250 Titles are now available. Patrons downloaded 3,992 magazines.

They fund the Museum Pass program.


They fund the MakerSpace programs.


They organize and execute the Summer Film Festival and the Foreign Film Series.

We owe a special acknowledgment to Allan Atchison who donated \$10,000 in memory of his wife Anne. Alan was a Library Trustee during the 1970s renovation of the Library. He was also a teacher and Principal in town. Allan's donation alone permitted us to replace the aging and rusting book returns with an aircraft-grade aluminum return. We also added four iMacs to the public computer mix.

The Lê Family also contributed a sizeable donation to the Library. Study Room #2 is named in memory of Daw Ngwe Kyi.




The Library also expended \$8,688.44 from the reserve account to repair carpet and replace computers.



The Library continues to lead area libraries in terms of total annual circulation. This high level of activity resulted in Hillsdale Library having the lowest cost per circulated item among all 75 libraries in the Bergen County Cooperative Library System from 2007 through 2013. In 2014 the library was ranked 3d lowest at \$3.85 per circulation. The BCCLS average is \$7.52.

Fast Facts:

- 359 new borrowers were registered in 2014. There are 6,878 registered Hillsdale Library cardholders. Of these, 3,243 used their card at least once this year. An additional 1,699 used their card at least once in the last two years.
- The Library was open 2,814 hours during 338 days.
- Although annual circulation of items did drop in 2014, Hillsdale Library remains the leader among area libraries.
- The Children's Room alone circulated more items (100,463) than 32 other libraries in the Bergen County Cooperative Library System.
- Approximately 119,000 people visited the Library.
- 3,360 visitors participated in 242 Library sponsored programs.
- 1,285 visitors participated in 101 community group activities held in the meeting room.
- 13,700 People used a library computer during the year. This does not include wi-fi users or children's department computers.
- 4,561 books, 159 audiobooks, 554 DVDs, and 194 CDs were added to the Library's collection. There are 73,153 items in the total collection.
- Two adult students in our ESL / Literacy program became U.S. citizens. Another student earned a driver's license after passing the written test.



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
